Tina Muña Barnes and other senators announced that they would be working together on a bill to pay war reparations locally, in light of the delay at the federal level. When The Guam Daily Post asked if they had spoken to the congressman about it, they said they had communicated with him about war reparations in general.

The congressman was quick to point out that he, in fact, had not been made aware of the intent to pay war reparations at the local level. He had said getting the names of those World War II survivors – whose claim forms have been reviewed and vetted – would be difficult. And coming up with a mechanism to draw down on Section 30 funds intended for them and avoiding a double payout would be complicated and could hamper efforts to pass H.R. 1365, he added.

H.R. 1365, for which Gov. Leon Guerrero reiterated her support on Thursday, fixes a technical issue overlooked when passed during the time of Del. Madeleine Bordallo, who is now Adelup's liaison in Washington, D.C.

If passed by the U.S. Senate and signed into law by President Donald Trump, H.R. 1365 would eventually allow for the payment of up to \$40 million in war reparations in the coming years for the more than 3,000 Guam war survivors who have filed claims.

Bill 181, introduced by Barnes, would create a local war claims fund and authorize the governor to transfer "up to" \$7.5 million into it. That amount would cover only the roughly 750 claims that have been adjudicated by a war claims commission.

The speaker said on Thursday she has spoken with the governor and budget director Lester Carlson and they assured her "that funds are available."

San Nicolas has warned lawmak-

ers that Bill 181 - which relies on government of Guam funding rather than Section 30 funds - could leave GovGuam holding the bag.

At Thursday's meeting, the governor repeated that Bill 181 complements H.R. 1365, and that she supports his efforts to get it passed.

The congressman responded that the governor can't say she supports him while failing to heed his warning that the local bill could compromise efforts to pass the congressional bill, which is attached to funding and has other mechanisms in place.

The governor said: "I'm going to go and continue fighting for Bill 181; you, I expect, will continue to fight for H.R. 1365 and in the end, we are going to provide the war reparations for our manamko'."

"Governor, I'm just concerned," San Nicolas started to say.

The governor said: "I have heard your

concerns. I note your concerns, I don't think there's a risk with those concerns and you're repeating yourself."

"I don't want to do anything that's going to cause 1365 to move any slower. And right now the situation in Congress is so delicate ... that for us to move this thing forward we're going to need bipartisan support," he said.

He said a recent delegation of Republican senators from Guam helped because after his meeting with them, they were able to meet with Republican congressmen.

"I'm asking you if you want to support me, please don't push that bill and let's both jointly push for Bill 1365 as a single solution," San Nicolas said.

The governor said: "I guess we'll just have to disagree."

The governor's office contends San Nicolas couldn't name specific senators whom he had personally met on the issue.

He was on pretrial release in two separate cases. In one of the cases, Fortes was placed on house arrest in April and ordered to obey all laws and not consume alcohol. He is also on probation for another case.

pets with a hammer then tossed their bodies into a pile of trash," said GAIN board President Cyrus Luhr. "But it appears they were still alive after the attack. They suffered and cried all night," he added.

Luhr said one dog "still cried in pain after we found him."

The dog was rushed to Animal Medical Clinic, where its veterinarian, Kevin Malakooti, determined the dog had extreme brain damage and needed to be euthanized to end its suffering, GAIN stated.

Both dogs appear to have been wellfed, domesticated pets of medium size, GAIN stated. At this time, their ownership is unclear.

Arrest in domestic violence

An individual was apprehended at the scene on the domestic violence case and is currently being treated for injuries, GAIN stated. It is unclear whether any arrest on charges of animal cruelty have been made

Police have not released information on the beating of the dogs or the family violence arrest.

Yigo is the same village where a pet dog was shot and killed in 2018.

In that case, the man accused in the shooting and killing of the pet dog named Pugua in a family's carport was left off the hook.

A Superior Court of Guam judge dismissed a second superseding indictment against defendant Gerald Wayne Cruz II.

Cruz was charged with animal cruelty with a special allegation of use of a deadly weapon in the commission of a felony, possession of an unregistered firearm, and one count of unsworn falsification.

The prosecution has filed its notice of appeal on the court's dismissal of the case.

There has been no indication linking the recent beating of the dogs to the shooting of Pugua. (Daily Post Staff)

Trudeau's Liberals take early lead

OTTAWA (Reuters) - Canada's ruling Liberals took an early lead after polls closed in four provinces on Monday, as Prime Minister Justin Trudeau battled to remain in power after two major scandals and a spirited challenge by the opposition Conservatives.

The Liberals were leading or elected in 25 of 32 electoral districts in Atlantic Canada by 8:30 p.m. EDT despite a drop in their overall popular vote from the 2015 election, according to the Canadian Broadcasting Corp.

Some Liberal losses had been expected in the region after Trudeau led the party to a clean sweep there four years ago. Atlantic Canada makes up less than 10% of the seats in the House of Commons.

The national race was expected to be closer as Trudeau, who took power as a charismatic figure promising "sunny ways," battles Conservative leader Andrew Scheer for the chance to form the next government.

Polls close in the vote-rich provinces of Ontario and Quebec at 9:30 p.m. EDT. National voting is scheduled to end in the Pacific Coast province of British Columbia at 10 p.m. EDT.

Trudeau, 47, the Liberal Party leader, was endorsed by former U.S. President Barack Obama in the final stretch of the campaign and is viewed as one of the last remaining progressive leaders among the world's major democracies.

But he was shaken during the campaign by a blackface scandal and has been dogged by criticism of his handling of a corruption case involving a major Canadian construction company. Trudeau, the son of the late Liberal Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, has also had to overcome a sense of fatigue with his government.

Trudeau, accompanied by his family, voted in Montreal on Monday after a marathon sprint campaigning across the country in the past four days. Scheer voted in his Saskatchewan electoral district.

On Twitter, he repeatedly urged people to get out and vote. Voter turnout is crucial for the Liberals, who privately fear low engagement will affect them more than the Conservatives.

'The truth is it's a coin toss right now," Ipsos pollster Darrell Bricker said.

A year ago, no one would have predicted that Trudeau risked becoming the first prime minister since the 1930s to secure a parliamentary majority and then fail to win a second term.

The latest opinion polls suggest he may narrowly avert that result and could win a minority in the 338-seat House of Commons. That would still leave him in a weakened position and needing the support of left-leaning opposition parties to push through key pieces of legislation.

Brexit in limbo after vote block

LONDON (Reuters) Prime Minister Boris Johnson faces a potentially perilous ratification of his Brexit divorce deal in the British parliament after the speaker refused to allow a vote on it on Monday.

With just 10 days left until the United Kingdom is due to leave the European Union on Oct. 31, the divorce is again in disarray as Britain's politicians argue over whether to leave with a deal, exit without a deal or hold another referendum.

The government is trying to force through the legislation needed for Britain to leave the bloc in the shortest time possible, drawing cries from opposition lawmakers that Johnson was trying to bully and rush lawmakers into passing the bill.

Earlier, House of Commons speaker John Bercow said a vote should not be allowed on Monday as the same issue had been discussed on Saturday when opponents turned Johnson's big Brexit day into a humiliation.

"In summary, today's motion is in substance the same as Saturday's motion and the House (of Commons) has decided the matter. Today's circumstances are in substance the same as Saturday's circumstances," Bercow told parliament.

"My ruling is therefore that the motion will not be debated today as it would be repetitive and disorderly to do so," Bercow said, provoking the ire of Brexit supporting lawmakers who said they had been refused a chance to vote on Johnson's deal.

Bercow said the government could still secure ratification for the Brexit deal by Oct. 31 if it had the numbers in parliament. Johnson was disappointed by the decision, a spokesman said.

But the speaker's decision means that the government will have to try to push on with the legislation needed for ratification, a process opponents are plotting to wreck with amend-

ments that would destroy Johnson's

Jacob Rees-Mogg, the leader of the House of Commons, said the government wanted the lower house of parliament to finish voting on the bill on Thursday, before it heads to the upper house, which also has to approve it before the Brexit deadline.

"Trying to ram through legislation of this complexity, significance and long lasting consequences in just 3 days is an abomination of scrutiny and democracy," said Nicola Sturgeon, the leader of the Scottish National Party.

Ambushed in Parliament

Johnson was ambushed in parliament on Saturday by opponents who demanded a change to the sequencing of the ratification of the deal, exposing the prime minister to a law which forced him to request a delay until Jan. 31.

He sent the note to the European Union unsigned - and added another signed letter arguing against what he said was a deeply corrosive delay.

Brexit Secretary Steve Barclay said European Council President Donald Tusk had accepted the delay request as valid and was considering it.

The European Union, which has grappled with the Brexit crisis since Britons voted 52%-48% to leave in a 2016 referendum, decided on Sunday to play for time rather than rush to decide on Johnson's request for a delay.

After notice was duly given, pursuant to the Open Government Law of Guam and the Bylaws of the Authority, the Board of Commissioners' regularly scheduled board meeting was called to order at 12:00 p.m. by Chairman Flores. He welcomed the newest board member, Mr. Frank Ishizaki, to the meeting. He also indicated that 4 members of the Board of Commissioners were present, representing a quorum. He called the meeting to order on Friday, October 25, 2019 at 12:00 p.m. in the GHURA Sinajana Main Office, 1st Floor Conference Room.

III. APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS BOARD MINUTES - October 11, 2019

[233/19] - A motion was made by Commissioner Pereda to approve the minutes of October 11, 2019 as corrected. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Dominguez. There were no objections to the motion. The motion was approved.

IV. NEW BUSINESS

1. [234/19] - Intent of Award IFB#GHURA-09-09-2019-AMPs 1 & 3, Up-grade and expand existing storm drainage system at AMPs 1 & 3

Mr. Santos indicated that the bid opening for the project was held on October 8, 2019 at 2P.M. There were 2 bid items, one was to upgrade the drainage system, which had been clogged from years of erosion. Flooding had also occurred. Bid item #2 was to address the issues around the catchment system.

Out of the 6 vendors that obtained a set of bid specification packets, only 2 submitted bids.

After reviewing the bid results, the staff had determined that Genesis Tech Corp had the lowest responsible responsive bids for both bids 1&2.

Based on the staff's determination, Mr. Santos requested that the board approve the contract with Genesis Tech Corp. for bid items 1 and 2 in the amount of \$238, 500.00 for the upgrade and expansion of the existing storm drainage system at AMP1 and 3. Commissioner Dominguez asked how long, after approval from the board, would the project begin. Mr. Santos added that he would like the contractor to take advantage of the dry season and begin as soon as possible.

Vice Chairwoman Guzman inquired about the usual timeframe of the process for a project, from the approval of the board to the notice to proceed. Mr. Santos said that the process usually takes a couple of months. The process involves an assigned attorney from the Office of the AG to review contracts over half a million dollars, and the Director and the controller sign to the contracts. GHURA also has the authority to process all its procurement needs. This process has decreased the length of time it takes for a project to proceed, which Vice Chairwoman Guzman indicated usually takes 4 months.

[235/19] - A motion was made by Vice Chairwoman Guzman to approve the awarding of IFB#GHURA-09-09-2019-AMPs 1 & 3, Up-grade and expand existing storm drainage system at AMPs 1 & 3, to Genesis Tech Corp., in the amount of \$232,000.00 for base bid item #1 and \$6500.00 for base bid item 2, for a total of \$238,500.00. The motion was seconded by Chairman Flores. There were no objections to the motion by the other board members. The motion was approved.

Bid opening for the subject project was held on Oct. 8, 2019 at 2:00PM. There were a total of 6 vendors that picked up a set of bid specification of which 2 submitted a bid. Listed below are the results of the bids submitted, which were open and read out aloud.

In reviewing the bid results our staff has determined that Genesis Tech Corp is the lowest responsible responsive bidder for base bid 1 & 2. Contractor has several on-going GHURA projects which are all in progress to be completed within the next two months and had completed several major GHURA projects over the last 10 years with good standing, they also been cleared by Department of Labor compliance, OSHA and EPLS Debarred list (see attached verification).

Based on our staff's review and determination, we are requesting that the Board approves a contract with Genesis Tech Corp for bid item no 1& 2 in the amount of \$238,500.00 for up-grade and expansion of existing storm drainage system at AMP 1 & 3.

At the Regular Board Meeting of October 25, 2019, a motion was made by Vice Chairwoman Guzman and seconded by Chairman Flores to approve the awarding of IFB#GHURA-09-09-2019-AMPS 1 & 3, Up-grade and expand existing storm drainage system at AMP1 & 3 to Genesis Tech Corp., in the amount of \$232,000.00 for base bid item 1 and \$6,500.00 for base bid item 2, for a total of \$283,500.00. 





2. Include Exception Clause:

Complaints must include the name, telephone number and address of the complainant. The Chief Planner will provide a timely, substantive written response to every citizen complaint within 15 business days, as required by federal regulation. If the complainant is not satisfied with the Chief Planner's response, further appeals should be addressed to the Executive Management at GHURA, 117 Bien Venida Street, Sinajana, Guam 96910.

Thank you for your inquiry and for your attendance during two GHURA Board of Comissioners' meetings on 26 September and 11 October, 2019.

It is the continued determination of GHURA that no further action is due by GHURA with respect to this parcel purchase. This is the conclusion reached by technical staff and a review of the process by Counsel. The reasoning for our position is provided now in writing. It is the same as was presented to you in discussion during our 26 September meeting.

- The Asan Redevelopment Plan has concluded. GHURA's management of the 1977 Asan Redeveloment Plan ran for 41 years inclusive of the one year extension granted by the GHURA BoC.
- 2. The executed Grant Deed did not warrant the suitability of the property.
- No funding has been identified to assist Asan property owners post the 2018 project conclusion.

While the Authority believes it has acted in good faith to see the Asan Redevelopment project to conclusion, we recognize that not all of the associated actions will be the outcome anticipated.
