Dear Mr. Chandler:

On behalf of the Governor of Guam, I am pleased to submit the 2010 Guam Annual Action Plan (AAP) for the use of HUD Community Planning and Development funds for the Program Year 2010 (October 1, 2010 to September 30, 2010).

The projects selected are in line with Guam's 5-Year Consolidated Plan for 2010-2014. The PY10 AAP represents the first year under the current ConPlan. The projects outlined in this year's plan will greatly contribute to the welfare of individuals and families in our community. Our success could not have been attained without the cooperation and funding provided by the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development and the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnership Grant, and Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) programs.

CDBG funds are proposed to continue the funding of public services to homeless individuals battling substance abuse, operations of a homeless prevention and re-housing program, and to assist service providers to meet match funding needs for the CoC's Supportive Housing Program. CDBG funds are also proposed for the construction of two new public facilities and for the renovation of one elderly housing facility. The new facilities projects include an emergency shelter for women and children and a neighborhood multi-purpose community center.

HOME funds are proposed for new construction of affordable housing that will offer attainable homeownership opportunities to low/mod homebuyers.

ESG funds will continue funding for supportive services to the island's homeless population for operation costs and the provision of essential services.

The Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA) is the administering agency for HUD-funded activities in Guam. 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

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Executive Summary

Program Year 1 Action Plan Executive Summary:

The PY2010 Annual Action Plan report documents Guam's proposed use of U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Planning and Development (CPD) funds for the Program Year 2010. Program Year 2010 equates to Fiscal year 2011 (October 01, 2010 – September 30, 2011) to address priority needs and objectives of the community for housing, services, and community facilities serving low and moderate income populations. These priority needs and objectives are documented in Guam's approved 5-year plan, the Consolidated Plan PY2010-2014 (the ConPlan). PY10 is the first year implementation of activities Guam will pursue in the course of addressing identified needs within the community to address decent housing, sustainable communities, and economic development.

Daily administration of CPD grant funds and activities is delegated by the Governor of Guam to the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority.

Guam receives federal funds from the HUD CPD Office to administer the activities funded through three entitlement grants and two competitive grants. Guam is an annual recipient of entitlement funds and is eligible to compete nationally for use of the competitive grant funds.

- Entitlement Grants
 - Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)
 - Home Investment Partnership Grant (HOME)
 - Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG).
- Competitive Grants (Continuum of Care)
 - Supportive Housing Program Grant (SHP)
 - Shelter Plus Care Program Grant (S+C)

Objectives and Outcomes

Guam outlines PY10 activities according to the activity categories below. Additional detail of the specific objectives to be met with the proposed activities is detailed in the Table 3Cs attached to this report.

DECENT HOUSING

DH-1: Make Decent Housing Available and Accessible

DH-2: Make Decent Housing Affordable

- DH2.1 Sabanan Haya New Construction, Phase I
 - Guam will use HOME funds to (1) prepare a master plan for the development of housing in the village of Umatac and (2) to prepare the initial design for the first phase of homes to be constructed.

DH-3: Sustain the Available Housing Stock

- DH3.1 Renovation and Upgrade of the LIHENG Elderly Apartments
 - GHURA will use CDBG funds to renovate a 10-unit rental apartment complex for elderly low- and moderate-income renters. Renovations ill include the implementation of energy efficiency improvements, addition of perimeter fencing to improve security, and parking lot improvements.
- Homeownership REHAB Direct Costs
 - Guam will use CDBG funds to pay for costs related to the provision of services to homeowners to rehab their primary residence. The rehab activities will extend the functional life of a person's primary residence.

SUITABLE LIVING ENVIRONMENT

- SL-1: Make Suitable Living Environments Available and Accessible
 - SL1.1 Lighthouse Recovery Center
 - o Guam will use CDBG funds for the Lighthouse Recovery Center, a 30-bed transitional housing facility and program providing shelter and in-patient services to homeless men, and out-patient supportive services to approximately 310 men and women (out-patient only) recovering from chronic substance abuse.
 - SL1.2 Renovation and Construction of Macheche Neighborhood Multipurpose Facility
 - Guam will complete the development of a facility to serve as a multipurpose neighborhood center for community activities benefitting residents of Macheche, Dededo.
 - SL1.3 Design and construct Alee I Housing for Women with children
 - o GHURA will use CDBG funds to construct a permanent facility to serve as a shelter serving an identified special needs population of women with children.
 - SL1.4 Lighthouse Recovery Center (Operations Costs)
 - Guam will use ESG funds to provide for operations costs for the Lighthouse Recovery Center, a transitional living facility. No greater than 10% of ESG funds may be used for staff costs.
 - SL1.5 Lighthouse Recovery Center (Essential Services)
 - Guam will use ESG funds for essential services to residents of the LRC, a transitional living facility. Essential services include funds for the provision of case management (including staff salaries and benefits) and self-sufficiency training.

- SL-3: Sustain Access to Suitable Living Environments serving low- and moderate-income populations and special needs populations
 - SL3.1 Guma' Hinemlo (Cash Match funds for SHP)
 - O Guam will provide CDBG funds in support of the project sponsor of the Guma' Hinemlo program. Hinemlo' is a permanent supportive housing program for individuals with serious mental illness. The program is funded by a renewal award through the Continuum of Care Supportive Housing Program (SHP). CDBG funds will be used to assist the project sponsor to fulfill the cash match requirement of the SHP grant.
 - SL3.2 Family Services Center/One-Stop Homeless Assistance Center (HPRP Operations & HMIS Match funds for SHP)
 - (1) Guam will provide CDBG funds for FSC/One-Stop operations pertaining to activities of the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP). (2) Guam will provide CDBG funds in support of the project sponsor of the Homeless Management and Information System (HMIS), software utilized by homeless service providers to coordinate the delivery and reporting of services and facilities serving homeless persons.

General Questions

1. Describe the geographic areas of the jurisdiction (including areas of low income families and/or racial/minority concentration) in which assistance will be directed during the next year. Where appropriate, the jurisdiction should estimate the percentage of funds the jurisdiction plans to dedicate to target areas.

Beneficiaries must be located in geographic areas where at least 51% of residents are low or moderate-income persons. Activities are prioritized and selected to affect the greatest impact with limited resources to address the needs of target populations, service areas, and low- and moderate-income families and individuals.

Low and Moderate Income Populations

LMA¹ BENEFIT: Northern Neighborhood of Macheche in Dededo

PY10 CDBG funds committed to projects serving northern populations: 26.23%

CDBG funds will be used to construct a multipurpose facility in the Macheche neighborhood in the northern village of Dededo. The identified service area is home to 11,730 residents (6,821 low/mod residents) within the villages of Dededo and Mangilao.

HOMEBUYER ACTIVITY: Sabanan Haya

¹ An LMA, or Low/Mod Area is defined as one wherein greater than 51% of the area residents to be served is comprised of low- and moderate-income persons.

PY10 HOME funds committed to serving low- and moderate-income homebuyers to become homeowners: 85.00%

PY10 HOME funds will be used to conduct the initial phase of architectural design and engineering of a new mixed-income affordable housing development project to be located in the southern village of Umatac. Guam will develop, construct, and sell 40 units of affordable housing to qualified homebuyers.

2. Describe the basis for allocating investments geographically within the jurisdiction (or within the EMSA for HOPWA) (91.215(a)(1)) during the next year and the rationale for assigning the priorities.

In selecting activities and projects for funding in PY10, consideration is given to activities that will affect the greatest impact with the limited resources available. Selection is further considered for projects in terms of their impact to address the needs of target populations, service areas, and low- and moderate-income families and individuals in keeping with the priorities identified in the ConPlan.

Determining Areas of Service

In general terms, when the activity is to benefit an area, Guam divides regionally in terms of projects executed for the area benefit of northern, central, and southern populations. Guam's population is highest in the northern villages and decreases through the central and then southern villages. Until such time as Guam Census 2010 data is made available, Guam will continue to utilize Census Service areas and areas of low- and moderate-income populations determined from Census 2000 statistical data.

When assessing specific service areas (as with the proposed Macheche neighborhood facility) projects are reviewed, and the geographical areas analyzed, according to the proposed area to be served by the facility. For support of special needs populations, Guam consults industry professionals (i.e., homeless service providers, mental health, substance abuse, youth services, public health) for guidance and statistical analysis.

However, Guam does not allocate investments based solely on geographical location. Population and the ability to affect the greatest positive impact on the community for the dollars spent are also considered.

LMC² BENEFICIARIES: Various Activities
PY10 CDBG funds committed to projects serving LMLC populations: 50.96%

² LMLC, or Low/Mod Income Limited Clientele activities are those providing benefits to specific groups of persons rather than everyone in an area generally.

 The largest planned expenditure of CDBG funds is intended to benefit specific persons on the basis of income determination and/or another basic need identified as a need under the ConPlan. More than half of total PY10 CDBG funds will go to projects and activities providing for the needs of homeless persons, victims of domestic violence, and elderly renters.

LMH³ BENEFICIARIES: HOME Project Administration

PY10 CDBG funds committed to serving low- and moderate-income homebuyers to become homeowners: 2.82%

- In support of homeowner activities, Guam has set aside CDBG funds to provide for staff
 costs associated with the HOME Rehabilitation Loan Program (REHAB). The REHAB
 Program provides low-interest or deferred-interest loans to eligible low-income
 homeowners to sustain the functional life of their primary residences.
- 3. Describe actions that will take place during the next year to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs.

In this first year of Guam's five-year ConPlan, Guam is furthering its efforts to focus resources at a neighborhood level. Greater than 50% of all CDBG funds will assist special needs individuals, more specifically the homeless, victims of domestic violence, and the elderly. In accordance with the grant terms, 95% of ESG funds will benefit homeless persons. HOME funds will be used to fund the design and construction of affordable housing.

Limited Clientele and/or Special Needs Populations

Percentage of PY10 funds committed to projects serving victims of domestic violence: 31.47%

 CDBG funds will be used construct an expanded housing facility serving victims of domestic violence, women with children.

Percentage of PY10 funds committed to projects serving homeless persons: 12.93%

- CDBG funds will be used to continue an ongoing public service activity providing housing, case management, and training for homeless men recovering from substance abuse.
- CDBG funds will be used to support the operations of the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-housing (HPRP) Program. HPRP is an ARRA grant awarded to Guam, \$1,221,922 through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
- CDBG funds will be used to fulfill the cash match requirement of the Supportive Housing Program (SHP) for the local project sponsor administering Guam's HMIS (Homeless Management Information System.) HMIS is a tool utilized by the island's homeless

³ LMH, or Low/Mod Income Housing is an activity to assist persons to acquire, construct, or improve permanent residential structures.

- service providers to improve the reporting and delivery of services to the homeless.
- CDBG funds will be used to fulfill the cash match requirement of a second SHP award. The local project sponsor administering the Guma' Hinemlo' program operates a 7-bed permanent supportive housing facility for homeless persons with serious mental illness.

Percentage of PY10 funds committed to conduct rehabilitation on a rental facility serving elderly individuals: 6.56%

• CDBG funds will be used to rehabilitate a 10-unit rental facility serving elderly low-income renters.

Percentage of PY09 ESG funds committed to projects serving the homeless through the provision of essential services or operations of a shelter facility (limited clientele): 95.00%

- ESG funds will be used to provide for Operations Costs and Essential Services for transitional housing facility supporting homeless adult men recovering from substance abuse.

Managing the Process

1. Identify the lead agency, entity, and agencies responsible for administering programs covered by the consolidated plan.

As identified by the Governor of Guam, on behalf of the Government of Guam, the lead agency responsible for administration of the programs covered by the current ConPlan is the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA). GHURA is an entity of the Government of Guam.

2. Identify the significant aspects of the process by which the plan was developed, and the agencies, groups, organizations, and others who participated in the process.

This Annual Action Plan is the means by which HUD will review Guam's planned use of CPD funds for PY2010. The Annual Action Plan is also a tool for the general public and interested parties to be informed of the proposed uses of funds for the CDBG, HOME and ESG programs in PY2010. The activities selected for funding are in accordance with the Guam's current 5-year ConPlan for PY2010-PY2014 and the subject of this Annual Action Plan.

The process of developing the Annual Action Plan starts with the selection of eligible activities. This process for Program Year 2010 began in mid April 2010. A notice to the public was published announcing the availability of HUD funds for the coming year. Over a period of six weeks, from April 15, 2010 through May 27, 2010, interested applicants were encouraged to submit applicants to the lead agency for the proposed use of CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds. In all, over a dozen requests totaling nearly \$8M were received by the lead agency. In PY10, Guam's allocation of funds for HUD CPD activities is approximately \$4.2M, well short of the requests received. The lead agency conducted a rigorous review and analysis of all requests measured against the ConPlan priorities and the specific eligibility parameters of the particular grant programs.

3. Describe actions that will take place during the next year to enhance coordination between public and private housing, health, and social service agencies.

To optimize effectiveness, public and private organizations coordinate their efforts to deliver health and social services to persons receiving housing assistance. This is accomplished through a number of existing relationships. The Public Housing Agency receives referrals from the Dept. of Public Health and Social Service for the Housing Choice Voucher Program (formerly known as Section 8) and the Public Housing Program. Referrals are made to prevent children from being displaced from their family units whilst receiving also social services. Children and their families are afforded safe, decent, and sanitary housing. Clients of the Dept. of Mental Health and Substance Abuse are referred for tenant-based rental assistance through the Housing First Voucher Program administered by the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority. Tenants of Public Housing are afforded employment search and placement services through the Dept. of Labor's One-Stop Employment Center. The Public Housing Authority engages in the renovation of its public housing stock in order to sustain their availability as affordable rental housing. Guam continues to expand its stock of affordable rental housing through the use of Low-Income Housing Tax Credit program allocations.

Citizen Participation

1. Provide a summary of the citizen participation process.

Notice of Funding Availability

Beginning in April 2010, Guam published three notices to announce the availability of funds for the coming program year in the local Marianas Variety newspaper. The announcements of the NOFA (Notice of Funding Availability) is the annual start of the process to solicit interested applicants considering the use of HUD CPD CDBG, HOME and ESG grants for projects effective in the coming program year (effective October 01, 2010). The Notices were published on April 15, 27, & May 12, 2010. Through the NOFA, the lead agency provides information on the amount of funds available and details of the application process employed. Grant applications are available electronically via the website www.ghura.org. Paper applications are available throughout the

duration of the NOFA to answer questions and discuss potential project concepts and designs with the public.

Grant Application Workshop

Midway through the application process, GHURA conducted a Workshop for persons, organizations, and agencies interested in submitting applications to use HUD CPD funds in the program year 2010. Interested individuals and organizations attended the Workshop where the lead agency (GHURA) fielded both general and specific inquiries. Workshop attendees are afforded a briefing presentations intended to familiarize participants with the basics of the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs, and the criteria involved in determining the pool of projects to be funded in the coming program year.

Notice on the Use of Community Planning and Development (CPD) Funds

At the completion of the grant application submission process, Guam publishes its proposed award selections for consideration by the general public. On three occasions a 'Notice to the Public: Proposed PY10 Annual Action Plan and Project Selection' was published in the local Marianas Variety newspaper of general circulation to announce the selection of projects to be funded by CDBG, HOME and ESG funds. The Notices were published on June 25 & July 9, 21, & 26, 2010. An information link was also uploaded to the GHURA website at www.ghura.org.

2. Provide a summary of citizen comments or views on the plan.

Public Hearing & Solicitation for Written Comments

The Notice on the Use of CPD Funds included an announcement and invitation to attend a public hearing to discuss community concerns regarding the Plan and projects selected, and all related aspects to the process. The meeting was held on July 27, 2010. Written comments were accepted through July 28, 2010.

Public Hearing - Among the meeting attendees were representatives of various programs serving the island's homeless and low- and very-low income populations and government officials of the legislative branch and members of the lead agency staff and management. The meeting began with a review of the processes of application solicitation culminating in the meeting now assembled. Funding amounts were restated and the speaking floor was then opened for comments. A representative of one organization made inquiry after their request to be reconsidered for funding. Another organization expressed their appreciation for having been selected for funding and more broadly, for the assistance rendered with CDBG funds in the community as a whole over the years. Most of the day's inquiries though centered on the non-selection of a request to fund the purchase of a structure for use as an expanded shelter for women or women with children in recovery from substance abuse. A healthy discussion ensued and the listeners were afforded an opportunity to discuss the process of selection and review from which is determined the decision to fund or not fund an activity proposed and why.

Written Comments – Guam's CP written comment process yielded commentary on three different projects. In receiving letters from the public, the lead agency committed to reviewing

the information or comments provided and adding it to the discussion of the process, selection, eligibility, viability, or whatever aspect were addressed in the correspondences.

In a letter submitted by The Salvation Army Corps Guam, the organization requested reconsideration of the non-selection of the Family Service Center/One-Stop Homeless Assistance Program for funding in PY2010. The FSC/One-Stop of TSA is receiving program funds for the implementation of the ARRA HPRP grant. Guam has been assisting the FSC to recover for operational expenses related to the HPRP program. TSA also requested that GHURA consider continuing to provide match funds for the HMIS program. Guam accepts the comments of the organization and, upon review of the circumstances, has decided to fund the FSC/One-Stop to sustain the operations of the HPRP program staff and to continue to receive funds to meet the requirement of the SHP match for HMIS. Guam however elected not to include funds for the hiring of a new position within the FSC/One-Stop for non-HPRP activities. In a letter submitted by a member of the Guam Legislature, the lead agency was urged to support the construction of a neighborhood community multi-purpose facility in Macheche, Dededo. Guam accepts the comments provided and remains committed to keeping the proposed activity in the AAP. By far, the greatest volume of letters and petitions were received advocating reconsideration of an application to fund the purchase of a hotel facility for use as one-stop assistance center/training center/hotel/meeting facility/et al to benefit women (with and without children) in recovery from substance abuse. Eligibility of all proposed activities is elemental to inclusion in the Guam ConPlan. While the core activity of serving eligible women in substance abuse is eligible under CDBG, Guam is unable to substantiate that ancillary activities would likewise be eligible under CDBG as proposed. The ConPlan has identified the need for a woman's substance abuse recovery program/facility. However, the comments submitted in support of the program need do not address program viability or sustainability. The letters submitted on behalf of the women's facility and program offer insight into the real and tangible benefits of funding this type of facility. The lead agency remains committed to addressing this component of the ConPlan and will continue to work with the proposer and other NGOs to address the needs of women coping with substance abuse issues.

Other Efforts – The lead agency engaged in meetings and conversations with several legislative officials concerning the projects and activities proposed in the 2010 AAP. Over the course of the CP process, various meetings were held with executive branch officials, prospective grant applicants, village mayors, local representatives of Guam's Continuum of Care organization (the Guam Homeless Coalition), and others.

3. Provide a summary of efforts made to broaden public participation in the development of the consolidated plan, including outreach to minorities and non-English speaking persons, as well as persons with disabilities.

Organizations in attendance during the ConPlan public hearings included representatives from an array of service providers and interested persons, including: the Ilocano Association of Guam, the Guam Dept. of Labor, the Dept. of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, The Salvation Army Corps Guam, Oasis Empowerment Center, Sanctuary, Incorporated, the Mayors

Council of Guam, and Micronesia Self-Help Housing Corporation. Written comments were received from the Dept. of Mental Health and Substance Abuse I Famagu'on-ta Program, members of the Guam Homeless Coalition, a formerly homeless individual, the Guam Dept. of Labor One-Stop Career Center, and Catholic Social Service's Guma' Hinemlo Program.

4. Provide a written explanation of comments not accepted and the reasons why these comments were not accepted.

All comments provided by the public during this process were considered and accepted as valid discussion of concerns about the process or the actual activities proposed and not proposed for funding. The lead agency gave careful consideration and deliberation of the concerns represented during the discussions or through written submission by citizens and organizations. Not all comments, though accepted, resulted in a change or modification to the final slate of projects selected for funding.

Institutional Structure

1. Describe actions that will take place during the next year to develop institutional structure.

The institutional structure supporting the administration of Guam's Annual Action Plan activities is under constant review and assessment. The objective is to strengthen the processes and infrastructure utilized to administer and execute the activities of the ConPlan through each Annual Action Plan year. The lead agency routinely reviews policies, practices, and management of CPD fund subrecipients and grantees. In the coming year, primary areas for institutional strengthening will include:

- The four-person CPD Fiscal section will build upon the successful implementation of the financial management system. Under the direction of the General Accounting Supervisor, the CPD Fiscal section will initiate access to key reports utilized by Planners for the management and oversight of subrecipient activities. Both standardized and customized reports can be used to improve the analytical review and assessment of subrecipient performance.
- CPD Fiscal section will further refine the CPD internal controls and accounting policies and procedures.
- Planning staff will avail themselves of opportunities to improve grant management skills through the use of online or attendance at trainings, seminars, conferences, meetings, etcetera. Planning staff will continue their efforts to improve their skills in project management, strategic management, grant administration, performance monitoring, selfassessment, records management, pre-award assessment, and the review of best practices in risk management.
- Accounting staff will actively pursue attendance at trainings intended to maintain or improve technical proficiency and knowledge in accounting, general and specific to the administration of federal funds and HUD funds particularly.

- Planning staff and accounting staff will explore ways to improve the reporting of activities in HUD's IDIS (Integrated Disbursement and Information System) reporting system. Staff will continue to improve on the timely closeout of completed activities in the IDIS reporting system.
- Subrecipients and project sponsors will be afforded technical assistance and training in administering activities and projects funded by the various CPD grants. Planning and Fiscal staff will conduct workshops and individual or organizational meetings and trainings as necessary to afford subrecipients and project sponsors the greatest assistance practicable.

Monitoring

1. Describe actions that will take place during the next year to monitor its housing and community development projects and ensure long-term compliance with program requirements and comprehensive planning requirements.

Monitoring activities are conducted throughout the program year. Improving monitoring is a key element to the sound administration of funded activities and one that the lead agency strives to improve upon. Monitoring is the means to ensure accord with the laws and regulations governing the use of grant funds. GHURA will continue to provide training and access to the latest guidance available to grantees specific to the monitoring of program activities.

In PY2010, Guam will engage in the following monitoring activities:

- Guam will conduct on-site monitoring of all construction-related activities throughout the construction process. Monitoring will include compliance with applicable local and federal laws.
- CDBG Public Service activities (current active awards) will be monitored for performance measured against programmatic and financial requirement.
- CDBG public facilities constructed through past awards will be monitored for continued compliance with HUD objectives and eligible activities. As government-owned public facilities are held to compliance in perpetuity, monitoring is continual.
- On-site and remote monitoring of HOME activities will be conducted for homebuyer and homeowner programs.
- Guam conducts on-site monitoring of homeless program activities of the Continuum of Care. ESG, Supportive Housing and Shelter Plus Care grant activities are monitored annually.

The lead agency views the process of providing technical assistance, training and monitoring as Individual components of a process will can ensure a strong program. The following activities will occur throughout the coming year.

 New subrecipients and grantees will attend a mandatory initial orientation workshop at the start of the program year.

- Planners will continue to be charged with the full responsibility for project oversight of individual projects.
- Individualized training will be provided, as necessary.
- Technical assistance will be provided, as requested or deemed necessary.
- The lead agency will continue to monitor for enforcement the submission of expenditure reimbursement requests within 60 calendar days of the close of the period the expenses were incurred. Subrecipients and grantees are advised that non-compliance of material deadlines may result in delays to future reimbursement processing until the pending documents are submitted or the issue at hand is corrected.
- The lead agency will continue to hold subrecipient's and grantee's responsible for the timely submission of periodic reports in compliance with the terms of award.

Lead-based Paint

 Describe the actions that will take place during the next year to evaluate and reduce the number of housing units containing lead-based paint hazards in order to increase the inventory of lead-safe housing available to extremely low-income, low-income, and moderate-income families, and how the plan for the reduction of lead-based hazards is related to the extent of lead poisoning and hazards.

Guam addresses the dangers of lead-based paint in existing and future housing by facilitating the availability of information to homeowners and homebuyers of all income levels. Guam also ensures that procedures are implemented to provide information to families and individuals on the dangers of lead-based paint before they commence the search for rental housing.

GHURA maintains a pool of approximately 2,500 housing vouchers under the Housing Choice Voucher Program (HCVP). New HCVP tenants attend an initial briefing as part of their initial entrance into the program. Participants are instructed on the hazards of lead-based paint and provided HUD-approved materials on the subject. HCVP building inspectors conduct lead-based paint inspections to ensure safety compliance prior to permitting occupancy for any individual or family participating in the program. An equivalent process is maintained for the 750 units of Public Housing administered by GHURA. PH administration is mandated to comply with all federal laws regarding the operation and upkeep of units receiving federal funds.

The Housing First Voucher Program (HFVP) is a tenant-based voucher program for individuals with disabilities in need of rental housing assistance. The HFVP mirrors the compliance monitoring activities of the HCVP to ensure safety against the hazards of lead-based paint of its program participant renters/tenants.

The Homeowner Rehabilitation Loan Program (REHAB), as administered by the Community Development Division of GHURA, provides loan funds to eligible homeowners to make needed repairs and improvements. The home inspection component of the loan qualification process includes a review for lead-based paint safety.

GHURA's execution of the Weatherization Assistance Program⁴ will include referrals to the REHAB program, households who may qualify for assistance to rehabilitate homes to comply with local building code requirements. Households which present potential hazards of lead-based paint shall be administered the same notification and assessments as the REHAB program.

HOUSING --

Specific Housing Objectives

1. Describe the priorities and specific objectives the jurisdiction hopes to achieve during the next year.

Guam's specific housing objectives for the program year 2010 are pulled from the current approved Guam Consolidated Plan. The overall goal of these activities is to make decent housing available, accessible, affordable, and sustainable.

Decent Housing - Available and Accessible

- Universal Design elements in Affordable Housing Disabled homebuyers will have increased opportunities to purchase affordable housing with reduced need for modifications.
 - In the development of the HOME-funded Sabanan Haya project (see next bullet), Guam will pursue the use of universal design elements intended to reduce the need for modifications to standard residential design to accommodate some of the needs of homeowners with disabilities.

Decent Housing – Affordable

- Sweat-Equity housing programs, Down Payment and Closing Cost Assistance Program, Single-Family and Multi-Family housing construction, Housing Choice Voucher Homeownership Program, Tenant-Based Rental Assistance – Guam will create more opportunities for homeownership among low and moderate-income homebuyers, firsttime homebuyers and minority homebuyers. (Sabanan Haya New Construction, Phase I)
 - O Guam will use HOME funds for the design and engineering of the first phase of Sabanan Haya. The first phase may comprise of as many as 40 units to be built and sold to low- and moderate-income homebuyers. Sabanan Haya shall be planned as a mixed-income affordable housing development.
- Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program (LIHTC), Maximize development of housing zoned R-1, Tenant-based Rental Housing Assistance – Guam will increase its supply of affordable rental housing.

 Guam will continue to utilize available low-income housing tax credits for the development of affordable rental housing. The U.S. Internal Revenue Service LIHTC program is administered locally by the lead agency.

Decent Housing – Sustainable

- Renovate or rehabilitate Elderly Housing Guam will sustain the functional life of housing for elderly persons. (Renovation and upgrade of the LIHENG Elderly Housing)
 - LIHENG Elderly is a 10-unit apartment complex for low- and moderate-income elderly renters.
- Homeowner Rehabilitation Loan Program, and Renovation of Public Housing Units -Guam will implement programs to support retention of its existing stock of affordable housing for homeowners, renters, and persons with populations with special needs. (Homeownership Rehabilitation Direct Costs)
 - Guam will utilize CDBG funds to support the cost of providing services to homeowners interested in qualifying for the REHAB program. R
 - EHAB clients receive assistance to sustain the functional life of their homes.
 Renovation is done to the primary home to return it to compliance with local building codes and/or to retrofit homes to address the physical needs of disabled adults residing within the household.
- Describe how Federal, State, and local public and private sector resources that are reasonably expected to be available will be used to address identified needs for the period covered by this Action Plan.

In PY2010, Guam receives an allocation of federal grant funds through the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development, Office of Community Planning and Development. In total, \$3,050,372 is available through the Community Development Block Grant Program. Another \$1,405,903 is received through HUD's HOME Investment Partnership Grant Program.

Low Income Housing Tax Credits in the amount of \$2,430,000 are allocated to Guam and are used to develop affordable rental housing for low and moderate-income individuals and families.

The U. S. Dept. of Agriculture Rural Development Office provides developer loans for affordable housing and low-interest mortgage loans to qualified individuals.

The Guam Housing Corporation, an autonomous agency of the Government of Guam, offers mortgage loans to eligible first-time homebuyers.

Needs of Public Housing

 Describe the manner in which the plan of the jurisdiction will help address the needs of public housing and activities it will undertake during the next year to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership.

The public housing agency/authority has set goals for the next five years (2009-2013) to include the following, in support of their various income level clients:

- Implement the Housing Choice Voucher Homeownership Program (HCVHP). The HCVHP
 Program provides qualified tenants of the Housing Choice Voucher Program (HCVP) with
 an means to accumulate funds for the future use in home purchase and to receive
 homebuyer education in support of sustaining homeownership.
- 2. If the public housing agency is designated as "troubled" by HUD or otherwise is performing poorly, the jurisdiction shall describe the manner in which it will provide financial or other assistance in improving its operations to remove such designation during the next year.

GHURA is Guam's public housing agency. GHURA is not designated as "troubled" by HUD, nor is it identified as a poor performer.

Barriers to Affordable Housing

1. Describe the actions that will take place during the next year to remove barriers to affordable housing.

The goal of reducing barriers to affordable housing is the increase of both the number of renters and homeowners among low- and moderate-income households. Homebuyers and renters alike continue to struggle with impediments to securing affordable housing.

In PY2010, Guam will work through island policy makers and the executive branch departments and agencies to identify and enact reasonable methods and practices to reduce barriers.

Guam continues to assess housing purchase and construction activity. Recent reports continue to support the escalation of the average home purchase price. Issues in the forefront of the barriers discussion include Guam's appreciating market for existing homes and developable property island-wide, the increased cost of primary utilities, a lengthy and costly development approval process, and severely limited capacity of existing water and sewer infrastructure in prime development areas on Guam.

Of increasing importance is the supply-side concern for future affordable housing in the face of

the imminent movement of over 10,000⁵ active duty U.S. military personnel, plus supportservice personnel and dependents. All totaled, the Guam population is facing an unprecedented population increase of over 20,000 individuals, armed forces personnel and civilian in a significant and abbreviated timeframe.

HOME/ American Dream Down payment Initiative (ADDI)

- 1. Describe other forms of investment not described in § 92.205(b).

Guam plans to execute the recapture of grant funds from the homebuyer in the event of elective sale, or, default and foreclosure.

Guam will not use HOME funds to refinance existing debt secured by multifamily housing being rehabilitated with HOME funds. Guam will not engage in the refinancing of existing debt in any form.

HOMELESS

Public sources of funds identified in PY2010 to address the needs of the homeless come from federal, local, and private funds. Federal resources are both obtained through active competition and entitlement allocations through the Community Development Block Grant, Emergency Shelter Grant, Continuum of Care Supportive Housing Program and Shelter Plus Care Programs, the U.S. Veterans Administration, and FEMA (Emergency Food and Shelter Grant). Local government resources include funds utilized by the Dept. of Mental Health and Substance Abuse in the service of their adult and youth consumers, the Dept. of Public Health and Social Services (BOSSA - Bureau of Supportive Service Administration), Guam Memorial Hospital, Department of Corrections and others. Partner organizations undoubtedly add to this list of funding resources as they secure and employ new funds after the beginning of the program year.

Private funds raised by the various NGOs involved in providing services to the homeless are quite limited, but very important to the process. Every opportunity to leverage federal and local

government resources is encouraged and indeed welcomed. Community donation efforts will be engaged through the year for the benefit of service organizations aiding the homeless such as Elim Pacific Ministries (Oasis Empowerment Center), The Salvation Army Corps Guam (Lighthouse Recovery Center and Family Service Center), Catholic Social Service (Guma' San Jose, Alee Shelter, and others). In some instances, parent organizations of the local arm of an entity (such as The Salvation Army Corps Guam) also provide additional funding for local operations and activities in support of the homeless.

Guam encourages the introduction of new service providers and the growth of existing service providers in an effort to better meet the needs of Guam's homeless. Ultimately, it is only through the concerted effort of all organizations serving the homeless that the greatest good can be achieved, namely, the appropriate housing for all persons and the end of homelessness in Guam.

2. Homelessness—In a narrative, describe how the action plan will address the specific objectives of the Strategic Plan and, ultimately, the priority needs identified. Please also identify potential obstacles to completing these action steps.

(ConPlan) Guam will add to the existing inventory of emergency shelters and transitional housing serving homeless individuals and families. (The Alee Shelter for Women with Children)

Guam will fund the construction of a permanent facility and increase capacity to serve
as a shelter for victims of domestic violence. The facility will serve women and children
to prevent homelessness and provide a suitable living environment to the family. (CDBG
funds)

(ConPlan) Guam will support the operations of residential substance abuse treatment and recovery facilities serving homeless individuals. (The Lighthouse Recovery Center)

 LRC is a transitional living facility providing residential treatment to men in recovery from substance abuse. The facility admits homeless individuals as well as eligible other low- and moderate-income substance abusers. (CDBG & ESG funds)

(ConPlan) Guam will support the work of organizations providing housing and supportive services to homeless individuals. (HPRP & Operations / HMIS Match Funding / Guma' Hinemlo Match Funding)

- Guam will continue to implement the homeless prevention activities of the ARRA-funded Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP). Rapid re-housing of the chronically homeless is a direct commitment of the HPRP program. The Family Services Center of The Salvation Army Corps Guam will be funded for the operations of the HPRP Program. (ARRA HPRP & CDBG Public Service funds)
- Funded by the Continuum of Care Supportive Housing Program, the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) is the data management system for the island's homeless services providers. Funds will be provided to satisfy the programmatic match funds requirement. (Supportive Housing Program and CDBG Public Service funds)

 Also funded by the Continuum of Care Supportive Housing Program, the Guma' Hinemlo program is a 7-bed permanent supportive housing residential facility for persons with serious mental illness. Funds will be provided to satisfy the programmatic match funds requirement. (Supportive Housing Program and CDBG Public Service funds)

All total, the Continuum of Care grants, SHP and S+C, six programs renewed and one new project for funding effective during the Annual Action Plan program year include:

- LRC Aftercare Housing Program LRC Aftercare is a tenant-based rental voucher program. Lighthouse Recovery Center clients, having successfully completed the substance abuse and recovery program are afforded continued support services in conjunction with permanent supportive housing. (Shelter Plus Care)
- CARIDAD SSO Residents of the four-unit CARIDAD Apartments in Mongmong receive support services through the Supportive Housing Program. CARIDAD Mongmong is comprised of 4 1-bedroom units for persons with disabilities. (Supportive Housing Program)
- Guma' Hinemlo Hinemlo is a 7-bed permanent supportive housing facility for persons with serious mental illness. (Supportive Housing Program)
- HMIS The Homeless Management Information System is the data management system for the island's homeless services providers. HMIS is also the program-level record of services provided to the island's homeless population. (Supportive Housing Program)
- LIHENG Transitional Housing & Case Management Residents of the 14-unit LIHENG Apartments, a transitional housing apartment complex receive case management assistance for the duration of their stay. (Supportive Housing Program)
- Oasis Empowerment Center Oasis is a 6-bed transitional living facility for single women in recovery from substance abuse. (Supportive Housing Program)
- (NEW) CARIDAD Operations Sagan Ayudan Maisa The CARIDAD Apartments will now receive funds for operations of the program to provide supportive services to residents of the facility.

The needs of Guam's chronic homeless require a good deal of effort to bring together the resources needed to tackle the particular challenges of long-term or frequent and repetitive homelessness.

The Lighthouse Recovery Center (LRC) will be funded for the operations of a transitional shelter, residential substance abuse treatment facility for men. Outreach efforts target unsheltered and chronically homeless individuals.

Guam will assist the Guma' Hinemlo program with match funds in the operations of a permanent supportive housing facility for persons with serious mental illness.

Guam will continue to implement the homeless prevention activities of the ARRA-funded Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP). Rapid re-housing of the chronically homeless is a direct commitment of the HPRP program. The Family Services Center of The Salvation Army Corps Guam will be funded for the operations of the HPRP Program.

 Homelessness Prevention—The jurisdiction must describe its planned action steps over the next year to address the individual and families with children at imminent risk of becoming homeless.

To address homeless prevention, Guam will continue to implement the homeless prevention activities of the ARRA-funded Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP). The HPRP program is available to assist income-eligible individuals and households (with and without children) facing imminent eviction from rental housing or to assist with rapid rehousing efforts.

Guam will fund the construction of a shelter to assist women and children, victims of domestic violence. For many of these families, homelessness is a looming and tangible prospect. The funding of this shelter for women and their children can prevent their entrance into homelessness.

5. Discharge Coordination Policy—Explain planned activities to implement a cohesive, community-wide Discharge Coordination Policy, and how, in the coming year, the community will move toward such a policy.

The Guam Interagency Council on Homelessness (GICH) is charged with developing and overseeing Guam's community-wide discharge coordination policy plan. The GICH is comprised of government agencies and non-profit organizations serving homeless populations. Discharge Coordination Policies are intended to prevent persons exiting from extended stays (voluntarily or involuntarily) in government facilities or programs from being discharged into homelessness. Agencies implementing discharge coordination policies are the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, the Department of Public Health and Social Services, the Department of Youth Affairs, Guam Memorial Hospital, and the Department of Corrections. Guam's Discharge Planning Protocol is a document crafted by the GICH that establishes that all affected institutions make appropriate arrangement for discharge planning and specifically to those that find themselves homeless upon admission. The GICH Discharge Planning Protocol guides the development of an individual's discharge plan and does not allow release or discharge into homelessness, including not releasing to homeless shelters. Guam's discharge plan requires a person's exit from a treatment, correctional, or other custodial setting into some suitable residential accommodations within the community. The process of ensuring a smooth discharge from an institution begins upon admission. A discharge plan for transition to community living is developed with the participation and agreement of the individual and/or the individual's designated advocate or representative.

Emergency Shelter Grants (ESG)

While not a state, Guam is a recognized recipient of ESG funds as an insular area through its recognized status as an unincorporated territory of the United States. The Government of Guam is the designated recipient of ESG funds for the Territory. Guam does not allocate ESG funds to units of local government. Guam's use of Emergency Shelter Grant funds are described in Item 1 of this section on Homeless section. As an insular area, Guam presumes that the description of ESG funds used to address priority needs of homelessness, contained in the earlier section, is sufficient response.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT.

Community Development

 Identify the jurisdiction's priority non-housing community development needs eligible for assistance by CDBG eligibility category specified in the Community Development Needs Table (formerly Table 2B), public facilities, public improvements, public services and economic development.

PY2010 represents the first year of activities identified in the current ConPlan. Guam has built its Community Development priorities for the current Consolidated Plan for 2010-2014 within the construct of the system of performance measures first instituted by HUD approximately three years ago. Needs are structured along the following determinations for Guam:

Activities to make suitable living environments available and accessible

- Construct or rehabilitate facilities to serve low- and moderate-income communities and special needs populations
 - o Community centers, sports, and recreational facilities
 - Community Learning and Resource Centers
 - o Emergency and Transitional Shelters
 - Substance abuse and residential treatment facilities
- Operational support of facilities providing essential residential substance abuse treatment and recovery programs

Activities to sustain access to suitable living environments serving low- and moderate-income populations and special needs populations

- Improve access to public safety service in low- and moderate-income neighborhoods
 - Construction or rehabilitation of public safety facilities

Activities to make economic opportunities available and accessible

- Develop a microenterprise incubator

Catholic Social Service offers case management, job training and education remediation and enhancement to residents of the LIHENG Apartments, a 14-bed transitional housing apartment complex.

Elim Pacific Ministries provides women with job training coordination, job placement

assistance, and case management, and other services to homeless women in recovery from substance abuse, through the Oasis Empowerment Center.

The Family Service Center/One-Stop Homeless Assistance Center of The Salvation Army Corps Guam provides food bank services, case management, financial assistance to prevent homelessness, and other services to low-income and very-low income persons.

The Public Housing Authority refers tenants of public housing to the One-Stop Employment Center of the Department of Labor for job search, training and placement services.

The Crime Stoppers coordinator on Guam will receive the Web Tips information from an encrypted server in the states and pass it on to the appropriate law enforcement agencies.



Oversight, audit of Melekeok state finances sought

KOROR (Palau Horizon) – A Melekeok State Delegate asked the Office of the Attorney General to conduct an oversight and audit of the state finances which was recently rocked by controversy following the conviction of former Gov. Lazarus Kodep.

Del. Lentcer Basilius in a letter to Attorney General Ernestine Rengiil said that recent events involving the state have strengthened concerns on the issue.

"I have concerns about the Melekeok State government lack of transparency and about potential mismanagement of state funds." Basilius said.

He added that in the past the Attorney General's Office has assumed temporary oversight of the state government finances when allegations of state financial mismanagement have been brought up.

Man at strip club leaves baby in car


WELLINGTON (AP) —
Police arrested a man for leaving his 1-year-old baby in a car unattended during the early hours while he watched strippers at a nightclub in New Zealand's capital, and have placed the boy in welfare agency care.

A passer-by called police after seeing the sleeping baby in a car parked near the Mermaid Strip Club in Wellington about 3 a.m. Tuesday.

Police took the baby to the hospital and arrested the father, 42, after he was located in the club, Inspector Simon Perry said. The man faces a charge of leaving a child under 14 without reasonable supervision, Perry said.

The Child, Youth and Family agency has custody of the baby for five days while it works with the baby's relatives to decide on his future, agency deputy chief executive Ray Smith said.

New Zealand's commissioner for children, John Angus, said leaving a child alone in a car at night was an "extreme form of neglect."



Tokelau declares Pacific whale sanctuary

WELLINGTON (AP) - The three-island territory of Toke-lau declared itself a whale sanctuary Wednesday, adding a huge patch of sea to the total protected area of more than 7 million square miles that is off limits to hunting in the Pacific Ocean.

The isolated group of coral atolls with a land area of just 5 square miles (12 square kilometers) has outlawed whaling in its 116,000-square-mile (290,000-square-kilometer) exclusive economic ocean zone, spokesman Foua Toloa said.

"Whales don't recognize national boundaries, and Tokelau would be remiss if we failed to support our Pacific island neighbors in the quest to help recovery of the whales in our region."

Sanctuaries have only moral force, but are seen by supporters as helping support the recovery of decimated whale populations like the humpback and southern right whale.

Toloa made the announcement at a conservation meeting in New Zealand that condemned continued whalehunting by countries such as Janan

About 1.500 people live in Tokelau, a U.N. protectorate that remains a colony of New Zealand and lies about 300 miles (500 kilometers) north of Samoa.

Tokelau's new whale sanctuary takes the number of protected areas in the Pacific to 11, and together they cover some 7.2 million square miles. The territory's declaration

came as whale researchers and conservationists began a meeting of the South Pacific Whale Research Consortium in New Zealand. The grouping was formed by independent scientists to investigate the status of humpback and other whale species in the region.

The group noted that despite a global moratorium on commercial whaling being in force since 1986 and an international whale sanctuary established in 1994 in the oceans around Antarctica, more than 3,000 whales are hunted and killed for their

meat each year.

Japan alone kills hundreds of whales each year in Antarctic waters.
